Brief Recap of January 26, 2021 General Meeting of Everest Neighborhood

(with thanks to Jeanne Moore, ENA Secretary)

Meeting was conducted via Zoom due to COVID-19

Guests included Deputy Chief St. Jean of the Kirkland Police Department, Council Member Neil Black, and Deputy Mayor Jay Arnold

- MATCHING GRANT: Request for \$2042 from the City (for newsletter printing, neighborhood meeting signs, website, Everest Park kiosk refurbishment, additional fencing by the trail by Everest Park, Annual Neighborhood Picnic) was approved.
- NEIGHBORHOOD SAFETY PROGRAM: Attendees approved request for speed read out sign on NE68th St
 - KAN REPORT: Major topic of the last KAN meeting was the NE85th St Project and concerns that Alternatives 2 and 3 do not meet limits set by neighborhood comprehensive plans
 - Residents are encouraged to read the draft EIS and send feedback to City Council, Planning Commission, and Allison Zike, Senior Planner, before February 5th
- NE 85TH ST PLAN
 - Will include Rapid Transit Station on I405
 - We can influence the various proposals re land use within .5 mile radius which includes large portion of the Everest Neighborhood. Three Alternatives are listed in the plan.
 - Residents were encouraged to send their comments to the City Council and Planning Commission as well as to Allison Zike.
- DEPUTY CHIEF OF POLICE ST. JEAN: Crime continues to be low in our neighborhood. We were advised
 to be sure we lock our cars and bring our valuables inside
- Meeting was adjourned at 8:29 PM.

Kirkland's Comprehensive Plan is a statement of the kind of community Kirkland wants to become, envisioned by those who live, work, recreate and visit here. *The Plan is the basis for the zoning maps and related zoning regulations, which guide development permits in the City.* The Comprehensive Plan is used as a guide to decide where housing and business growth should occur, what transportation system we will have to support the growth, what types of businesses and jobs we want to encourage, what types of housing we should have in the community, and how we can protect our natural environment.

In short: The Plan sets the framework for the City's land-use pattern and what uses are allowed where.
